PULSE CHECK-IN

All children undertook this term's Wellbeing survey in Week 6. Students are asked seven questions to check on how they are going in areas, such as learning, belonging, safety and support. The results allow teachers to monitor the emotional wellbeing and engagement in learning of their students. Any serious concerns that may arise will always be communicated with parents.




Lost Property


